The Excellence in Education Award, given this year to the Marion Literacy Council, honors an organization demonstrating achievement, innovation, leadership and/or organizational excellence in support of literacy education in Florida. What started in a home den in 1999 has grown in to a true example of achievement.

Noticing a lack of adult literacy services in their area, this group has accomplished great

things in the time they have been together. With a "never give up" approach and a "don't take no a broad range of literacy issues; including one-toone tutoring, workplace literacy, English literacy, and GED preparation—just to name a few. Among the difficulties and challenges they encounter, the Marion County Literacy Council has been the main source of adult literacy services in their area.

2002 Florida Literacy Awards

The Flight for Freedom Award honors an adult student who has demonstrated exceptional performance and accomplishment in attainment and/or improvement of his/her literacy skills.

This year's award recipient, **Tony Nichols**, an adult learner at the Jacksonville Public Library's Center for Adult Learning since 1997, has been an outstanding student as well as an exceptional peer leader to his fellow students. The confidence and support that Tony shares with his classmates has spread throughout the program, inspiring students with his enthusiasm.

Many of Tony's classmates attended to see him accept his award and show their support for his accomplishments. Also in attendance to help Tony accept his award were Tony's wife; Pastor; and Anthony Shack, Tony's best friend and partner-learner leader.

Tony still attends class twice a week, and before each class meeting, he will greet his fellow students and tell them he is glad they came. Tony's personal progress is also exemplarily. He obtained his driver's license, reads work orders with greater ease, and reads to both his grandson and new baby daughter.

Since beginning his learning odyssey, **Tony Nichols** has become a spokesman for adult learning.

Tony was also featured in a documentary entitled, "When Mommy Can't Read." As a supervisor at his job, he was infinitivally concerned about losing the respect of his employees. However, Tony felt so strongly about reaching out to thousands of adults in need of assistance that he and his children appeared in the documentary.

Tony felt that having the opportunity to express his joy at now being able to read would stress to others the importance of doing the same.

The Governor's Family Literacy Initiative

Governor Hosted Second Annual "Celebration of Reading" Event to Support Statewide Family Literacy Initiative

The second annual "Celebration of Reading" event was held March 15, 2002 at the Registry Resort in Naples. Florida Governor Jeb Bush, along with his parents, former President Bush and Mrs. Bush and several distinguished authors gave their time to help raise funds for the Governor's Family Literacy Initiative.

Created in 1999 with support from the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy, the Florida Initiative supports both existing and new family literacy programs. The initiative expanded statewide last year, thanks to proceeds from the first Celebration of Reading event. Since it's inception two years ago, \$2.25 million dollars has been raised and 45 programs funded. This year, over \$1 million dollars was raised to continue this innovative program.

"Celebration of Reading" drew over 1,000 people by having notable authors read and discuss their selected works. This year's guest authors were best-selling mystery writers Mary Higgins Clark and Carol Higgins Clark, Presidential historian Michael Beschloss and Art Smith, personal chef to Oprah Winfrey. Attendees heard from the authors as well as from the Bush family. The Governor and former President both read from their personal letters and e-mails, while Mrs. Bush talked about her family and her dedication to literacy. The mother-daughter Clark team epitomized family literacy as they shared stories of their collaborative writing process and read passages from their recent work. Michael Beschloss treated the audience to archival audiotapes of Presidents Truman and Johnson and First Lady Ladybird Johnson. Art Smith discussed how family traditions and food are so intertwined.

A special moment in the program came when Marie Nadine Mathurin, a recent immigrant from Haiti, spoke to the audience about how she learned to read with the help

of the Initiative. She received a standing ovation for her moving testimonial.

"Family literacy incorporates the reading mothers and fathers must do with their children, and the learning children must do to succeed." said Governor Jeb Bush, "By improving literacy, we help the individual, the family and ultimately, society as a whole."

Organizations are chosen annually by the Initiative to receive up to \$50,000 each in grants for family literacy programs in counties across Florida. Grant recipients are a diverse blend of community and school-based organizations -including charter schools, libraries, housing authorities, local education foundations and faithbased institutions.

Private businesses and individual donors support the Initiative, including: Verizon Communications, Washington Mutual, Cooper HMS, Publix Super Market Charities, Comcast, Carnival Cruise Line and Walt Disney World. The Florida Literacy Coalition serves as the fiscal administrator and provides technical assistance to funded organizations. Tutor Tip!

Rubber Bands and Vowels

It is often difficult to teach ESL students how to lengthen vowels on the stressed syllable. Use a rubber band, and have the student stretch it as he speaks. The student can feel it stretching before he goes on to the next syllable.

Example: "I <u>al</u>ways go to the <u>store</u> in the <u>morning</u>"

Family Literacy Success Story


With the behind the scenes help of Dee Siemianowski and Anicca Pierre Fils of the Collier County Housing Authority, Marie Nadine Mathurin bravely climbed the podium at Celebration of Reading. Before an audience of 1,000 she shared her personal story of joy as both an adult learner and a teacher to her children.

"Before enrolling in this program, I had never read a book to my children, but now I have to read to them every day because my daughters will not let me get away with[out] that. Because of this program, I am learning every day how, as a parent, I am important in my children's education. The program helps me with my English. As a parent, I now know that I am my children's first and most influential teacher. Reading to my children while they are little will help them succeed in school." ---Marie Nadine Mathurin

Marie's Story:

Marie Nadine Mathurin has only been in the United States for seven months. She entered the Collier County Housing Authority Family Literacy Program within days of arriving in Immokalee, FL. She progressed quickly through their English for Speakers of Other Languages classes and applied to become a VISTA worker with the local Even Start Program. Marie Nadine has completed her National VISTA training and now works with other Haitian families in need of Family Literacy services. The Farmworkers Village Family Literacy Program includes English and Basic Skills classes for adults, chil-

dren's literature and activities for families, after school Satellite Library homework assistance and literature activities, home visitation, and family counseling. Marie Nadine has worked with a number of English instructors, but her Home Visitor, Anicca Pierre Fils, has been her constant mentor and supporter. Anicca attended *Celebration of Reading* with Marie Nadine. Together, they proudly presented how Family Literacy programs are changing lives.

Like all successful Internet services, mailing lists are based on a simple idea. When you mail a message to someone, you specify an address. If you want to mail a message to more than one person, you can set up a special group name that represents a list of email addresses.

Any message sent to the group name will be automatically sent to everyone in the group. People can talk, help one another, discuss problems, share information, and so on.
